**Leeds Building Society supports Money Talks exhibition  
at Leeds City Museum**

Early 20<sup>th</sup> century money boxes, passbooks and a large Coat of Arms are among the items loaned by Leeds Building Society to a new exhibition which opens next month.

Money Talks, at Leeds City Museum, explores the different forms money takes and the relationship people have had with currency over the centuries.

The exhibition focuses on the value of physical currency and its impact on culture across the world. It also looks at new technology and societies moving towards completely cashless systems.

The exhibition is sponsored by Leeds Building Society, which has loaned a series of items from its archives associated with the Society's long history in the city.

Colleagues from the society will also be running a series of school workshops to help children build their financial education and money skills.

Richard Fearon, Chief Executive of Leeds Building Society, said: "We're proud to sponsor this exhibition, which reflects the role money has played in our city's heritage.

"We have been in Leeds for almost 150 years, helping to put home ownership in reach of more people generation after generation. It will be fantastic to show how the Society has contributed to many of the important themes explored in the exhibition.
